Noah used his experiences at the club to share with his fellow pupils and teachers at Alderman Knight School through assemblies and notice boards.

The Millington family and Supporter
Liaison Team worked together alongside

Community Trust to explore the matchday
experience for children with special
needs.

Earlier this season, he also joined the Supporters Services Group for the dedicated Unite for Access match on 2nd March to welcome and chat to supporters.

What did it mean to you being a Club Ambassador?

It meant a lot to me. I had always wanted to do something regarding my autism. I knew I was capeble of spreading awereness. The things I did while I was the ambassador really boosted my confidence, and I've had a lot of brilliant experiences with the club in general.

Talking to Deve Hardy [Support Services Group matchday representative] and working with the SLO Team, it feels like a real community and everyone's friends:

What's been your favourite thing about attending Robins matches?

It has to be the interaction between the players and fans. Luke Southwood, Sean Long, Will Ferry and [former Cheitenham Town striker] Alfie May all have gone out of their way to improve our experiences.

Sean Long always makes time for the fans. He recognises us straight away, and he's really good with my sister. I've accompanied him out on the pitch before [for the dedicated Autism Awareness match last season].

I also had a training ground visit, which was probably one of my favourite things that I did as the Club Ambassador. I got to play indoor cricket with the team, and I was treated as if I was one of the lads:

What has it been like meeting more Cheltenham Town supporters?

Getting to know more of the fans has been brilliant. There's a lot more interaction. It brings a sense of family to it. Most people know each other where we sit in the main stand, and we all have a good chat.

What do you think is the best thing about the team right now? Darrell Clarks brought life back to Cheltenham. Before him, we were basically dead and buried. But the morale between the players, and the communication that I can hear going on the pitch is brilliant. They aren't just colleagues – they seem like a family.
